This revised edition of Weaving Made Easy improves on the first version of this book for rigid heddle weavers that was already the "go to" book for new and intermediate weavers who want to learn to weave on rigid heddle looms. There are a lot of good photos and the information is in an easy to read format with a friendly style of writing. The projects in this book are easy for beginners but not so simple as to not be appealing. Scarves to rugs to really nice napkins, there is a project for everyone. If you started at the beginning and made each project in order you would have a very good foundation and easily be able to plan your own projects next. The instructions will work for any brand of rigid heddle loom. The through detail of the yarns used in the projects make it easy to be

able to figure out what yarn substitutions can be made from your own stash. The one thing lacking in the first edition was an explanation of the direct warping method. This new version covers direct warping and still includes the other warping methods that can be done on these looms. The project planning section is dog eared in my own copy and I refer to it often when I forget how to determine the yardage needed for a project. This is one book you won't regret having in your library.
