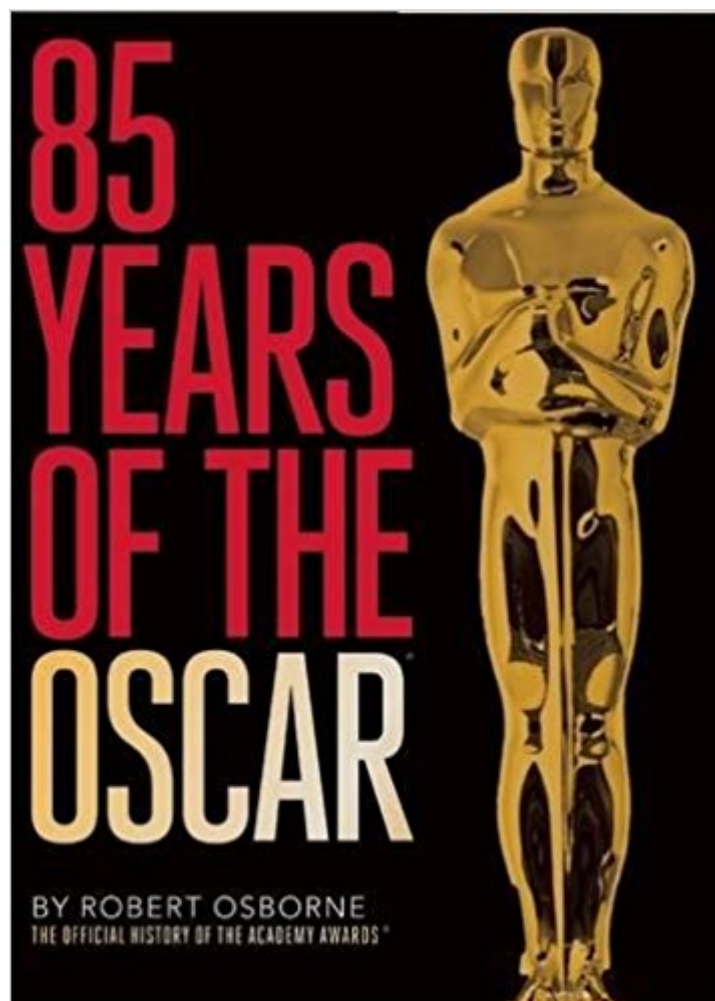

Synopsis

A deluxe, year-by-year chronicle of the Academy Awards, with an entertaining text, hundreds of star-studded photographs, and complete lists of the nominees and winners. 85 Years of the Oscar, newly revised and expanded, is the official history of the Academy Awards. Following an introductory chapter on the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences and the birth of the Oscars, the book presents the story of each year's awards, beginning with the very first, for the years 1927-28. Author Robert Osborne surveys the movies in competition, recounts the speculation on various winners, and describes events during the awards ceremony. He also provides a complete listing of all the nominees and winners in every category. Each year is illustrated with evocative stills from winning films and candid shots from the awards ceremony. Altogether, the book features more than 750 rare photographs, including original movie posters for every best picture. Drawing on Osborne's profound knowledge of film, the Academy's exceptional archives, and the personal reminiscences of stars from Katharine Hepburn to Clint Eastwood, 85 Years of the Oscar is unrivaled in illustration, accuracy, and completeness.

This is the ultimate browsing book for the movie fan. Pop a bowl of popcorn, pour your favorite beverage, and sit down in your chair with this giant tome propped on a pillow (believe me, you'll need it to save your lap). You'll then regret you have to get up to refresh your beverage. Filled with hundreds of photos, endless skeins of trivia, and as many statistics and winner/loser lists as you could want, this book is a treasure.The only caveat I would share is the print size. I bought this book

for my wife for Christmas, and she loves it, but the very small print makes it difficult for her. So either get your eyes checked or maybe buy a magnifier. I wear bifocals and have no trouble, so it's not microscopic, but be forewarned. Otherwise, the book is magnificent.

Yes, Osborne's book is expensive, but I buy it every five years when a new edition is published. And, the .com price is a REAL BARGAIN. No other book even comes remotely close to the authenticity of this exceptionally thorough volume. I have noticed that other books about the Academy Awards either contain outright false information or skip significant categories, nominees, and winners. Osborne includes every conceivable fact about the entire 85 years of the Oscars. The side bar commentaries from winners are fascinating and insightful. The vintage photographs and movie posters are likewise bonus features. This brand new edition is a treasure for people who love great films and are cinema history fans.

I did want to comment about the photos. Every year has photos of the major actors and actresses who won in scenes from their films. I couldn't help but notice that the photos chosen for this edition were not the best they could be. Some were out of focus and many just didn't have the quality that they should have for a book of this caliber. That is a minor complaint, however, and I would definitely recommend the book.
